# 2018 IPPS-SR Tour Description

## **Sunday Tour**



#### Tennessee State University Otis L. Floyd Nursery Research Center

Located in the heart of Tennessee's nursery-producing industry, the Tennessee State University Otis L. Floyd Nursery Research Center is a research facility dedicated to the improvement of the Tennessee nursery crop industry. The Center provides leadership in strengthening and expanding the nursery industry through research in pathology, chemical ecology, entomology, genetics, weed science and related horticultural topics, and through a partnership with the USDA is the location of ornamental plant breeding including *Clethra*, *Styrax* and *Cornus* and production horticulture research.

120,000 container-grown shrubs and tree liners of more than 120 varieties as well as over 200 acres of B&B nursery stock. They specialize in one and three gallon container liners grown in air root pruning, anti-circling containers. From Acer to Ulmus their goal is to produce premium plants at an affordable price

#### Blankenship Farms Founded in 1989, Blankenship Farms is a wholesale grower offering over

while also protecting the environment.

Turner and Sons Nursery is a family owned and operated container and bareroot nursery specializing in fruit tree production. Turner and Sons Nursery was established in 1977 by John Turner, a third-generation nurseryman. Fruit tree production has always been the foundation of the business, growing 30 varieties of apples in standard, semi-dwarf and full dwarf, 30 varieties of peaches, along with several other fruits including pear, plum, nectarine, blackberry, and blueberry. The nursery also produces ornamental trees and shrubs and has a fresh fruit orchard.

#### Simpson Nurseries

Simpson Nurseries was established in 1902 as a watermelon seed and pecan grower in Florida. The facility in McMinnville was opened 5 years ago and produces 600,000 plants in 3 to 30 gallon containers on about 100 acres. Simpson Nurseries grows a mixture of shade and fruit trees including 100,000 dogwoods. Simpson remains a leader in the nursery industry, developing new technology, production methods, and marketing ideas that are implemented throughout the country.

#### Mountain Creek Nursery

Mountain Creek Nursery was started by A.P. Hallum in 1959. It is currently managed by his sons, Michael and Mark Hallum. MCN began with bareroot fruit tree liners and B&B shrubs and shade trees. The first pot-in-pot section was created in 1992 and has expanded modestly ever since. We believe that you have to adapt to survive. Our specialty is container grown trees for independent garden centers.

#### Hale and Hines Nursery

Hale and Hines Nursery specializes in producing pot-in-pot shade and flowering trees in 15, 30, and 45 gallon containers. Water sensing technology is used to determine proper irrigation timing, and they are currently in the early phases of using drone technology for inventory and plant stress identification. Hale and Hines is constantly searching for innovative ways to reduce labor and improve efficiency. They produce over 450 varieties of container trees, as well as 60 varieties of field grown trees. The extensive list includes 70 maple varieties, 32 deciduous and evergreen magnolia varieties, 20 redbud varieties, 19 gingko varieties, 32 flowering dogwood varieties, and 19 oak varieties.



## 2018 IPPS-SR Tour Description

## **Tuesday Tour**

#### **Tennessee Valley Nursery**

Hoskins A. Shadow established Tennessee Valley Nursery in 1941 on 40 acres purchased in Franklin County. In the mid 1940's he began budding dogwood trees. He went on to pioneer a more efficacious system for dogwood production which is still in use today. His inventive method would prove to be very efficient and influential amongst his fellow nurserymen. Soon after, Winchester became the "Dogwood Capital of America." Tennessee Valley Nursery mainly propagates and produces dogwoods but also grows a large number of other woody liners with 40% of production in field-grown dogwoods, 50% in bed grown liners, and 10% in containers.

#### Lantenn Farms

Lantenn Farms is an Agricultural Cooperative Nursery owned by the 11 shareholder members of LANCO, Inc. The nursery operates 240 acres of B&B production in two tracts. The stockholders are the primary customers generating 98% of sales. The plant selections they grow are based on the needs of their stockholders. Varieties include dogwoods, viburnums, boxwood, arborvitae and junipers.

#### Herd Farms Nursery

Herd Farms Nursery is a family owned plant propagation nursery nestled at the foot of the Cumberland Plateau. They specialize in one and two year old bare root, bed-grown plants and field grown liners. Herd Farms Nursery began in the fall of 2000 with 24 beds and has grown to almost 300 beds. They propagate 25,000 dogwoods annually as well as 70 varieties of other trees and shrubs. Besides a working nursery, they host lively wedding receptions in a century-old wedding and reception barn.

#### **Hidden Hollow Nursery**

Hidden Hollow Nursery was founded in 1983 and is a specialty bareroot liner nursery owned and operated by Alex and Amy Neubauer. Approximately 200,000 plants are in production at any one time on approximately 20 drip irrigated acres. Hidden Hollow Nursery currently produces over 200 cultivars of woody ornamentals with an emphasis on new, unique, and dependable selections. Alex and his father, Harald, have helped introduce dozens of plants to the trade and are co-owners of four plant patents. In the last decade, the nursery has focused on labor saving mechanization and other efficiencies.

#### Jack Daniel's Distillery

Founded in the 1860s by Jasper "Jack" Newton Daniel, Jack Daniel's was the first registered distillery in America and celebrated its 150th year in 2016. Jack Daniel's is charcoal mellowed with hand crafted sugar maple charcoal and aged in white oak barrels made at Jack Daniel's and used only once. Jack Daniel's and BBQ go hand in hand and 2018 marks the 30th Annual Jack Daniel's World Championship Invitational Barbecue. The distillery offers tasting and non-tasting tours, time to saunter through historic downtown Lynchburg, and an evening to remember in their exposed beam and stacked stone fireplace pavilion.


