



# President's Comment

Recently, some of us IPPS committee members have been looking into the history of our region, and the people that have comprised the membership base over the course of it existence. Ian Gordon

published "A History of the Australian Region of the IPPS" in 1991, and completed a second volume in 2011, which covers in fine detail the people, places and meetings that have occurred under the banner of IPPS Australia to that time. We managed to track down a copy of this publication, and it has been interesting reading to say the least.

Since the idea of an Australian region was first floated at a meeting in Kings Cross in 1973, much has happened. Conferences have taken place in every State and Territory of the country. Techniques and technology have changed to a point that the early participants in those conferences would not have been able to conceive. Our industry, and indeed our world, is a very different place to the one back then. But something has been constant through all that time. That is, there have always been benefits that come from "Seeking and Sharing". When information and experiences can be openly shared, it is a win-win situation for all involved. Good for our industry, and good for the people involved in it.

My own name appears in that publication, as a Rod Tallis award presenter in Launceston. I remember the scary experience of presenting at my first conference like it was only yesterday. The date in the book however, tells me that it was 19 years ago! In that time, I have listened to countless propagators present about what to do, and what not to do, when it comes to propagating, growing and selling plants. I have talked to even more over lunches and dinners, on bus rides and at nursery visits. And maybe I have shared a little too. All in all, I have learned more in 19 years of seeking and sharing with real propagators than I could have in a life time in a library. And to think I could have missed out on it all were it not for the insistence of my boss at the time, Mr Peter Smith, that I "give it shot". So I know first hand, while it can be daunting to throw yourself into the fold, it is well worth making the effort.

The opportunity to benefit occurs again this year in Tasmania. Our 46th Annual conference - titled "Explore the Possibilities" - takes place from the 23rd to the 26th of May, at the Old Woolstore Hotel, in Hobart.

While there is a 'new and improved' format to this years conference, the core value of 'Seeking and Sharing' will still be at the forefront. Tony Van der Staay has done a brilliant job in organising what looks to be a top-notch gathering. See the article later in this newsletter for all the details about the conference, and the pre-conference tour. The Tasmanian conferences are always worthwhile attending. As a side note, it will be 38 years since Tony's father, Henry VanderStaay, organised the first Tasmanian conference, also in Hobart.

#### **Speaker Program**

**Paul Boland** - Ball Australia — "Current trends in plant propagation worldwide and in Australia"



Paul, our keynote speaker, is Managing Director of one of Australia's largest commercial plant propagators, Ball Australia and will speak on "the latest developments in commercial plant propagation in Australia and overseas". Ball Australia offers a daily national distribution of quality seed and vegetative lines for flowers, vegetables, herbs, cut flowers and tissue culture. Established in 2001, Ball

Australia's wholesale nursery is based 38km from Melbourne on a 40 acre site in Skye, Victoria. With environmentally controlled glasshouses, an automated production facility and state of the art despatch systems, Ball Australia has the flexibility of growing high-quality plants to supply growers with plugs all year round.

#### Other confirmed speakers

Mike Quarmby – Outback Pride Fresh – "Selection and



propagation of Australian native plants for food production"

The Outback Pride Project was created by Mike and Gayle Quarmby of Reedy Creek, South Australia in 2001. Their aim was to

provide opportunities for remote Aboriginal communities to access an industry where their traditional knowledge would be valued. Mike Quarmby, a true "tree chaser" and innovator, brought to the project his 45 years of experience in business, product and supply chain development and innate skill with botany. Mike has pioneered commercial cultivation in the native foods industry.

**Chris Read** – Diemen Pepper – "Selection and propagation of Tasmanian Mountain Pepper as a new food crop"



Chris Read has worked for many years in the areas of essential oils and floriculture, as researcher, technical adviser and practitioner. He currently operates a mixed horticultural enterprise on his coastal property, 'Five Bob', near Hobart in southern Tasmania, producing cut flowers (Dutch iris) Boronia Extract and pepper products.

**Professor Bob Menary** – University of Tasmania – Selection and propagation of species for the essential oil industry of Tasmania

Profile Bob has spent a lifetime as a researcher who has been instrumental in helping establish a wide range of essential oil crops in Tasmania. His hands on, practical approach to research and extension has also helped train and mentor people who have established crops such as opium poppy, pyrethrum, peppermint, mountain pepper, brown boronia, fennel and parsley seed. Selection and propagation of high yielding varieties has been a particular focus of Bob's work that he will talk about.

**Robert Ravens** Bridestowe Lavender Farm — "Hybridisation of lavender for essential oil production"



Robert is the owner of Bridestowe Lavender Farm which sets an Australian benchmark for excellence in agritourism. Each year more than 50,000 visitors from all around the world stroll through the stunning fields, set in one of the most photographed landscapes in Tasmania. The farm produces very high-quality lavender oil which has been enhanced through an in-house

breeding program to increase yield and oil quality, a program that Robert will elaborate on at the conference.



James Wood - Royal Botanic Gardens Hobart - "The Eden project - seed testing for storage of botanical germplasm"

James Wood is based at the Tasmanian Seed Conservation Centre of the Royal Tasmanian Botanical Gardens. He has worked in seed conservation for 27 years, working for Kew Gardens' Millennium Seed

Bank project prior to taking his current post in Tasmania.

**Michael Garret** – Bicheno Nursery – "Propagation and production of Australian ferns".

Michael Garrett from Bicheno Nursery, the 'fern man' during the late 80's and 90's was Westland Nurseries fern production manager, before establishing his own nursery at Bicheno on Tasmania's east coast. Mike is an expert on ferns.

**Paul Robert Thomson** – Van Diemen Quality Bulbs – "Practical workshop on Lilium bulb propagation"

Paul is carrying on a family business on the rich volcanic



soils of Table Cape in Tasmania's north-west. His parents Paul and Bronwen imported their first tulip bulbs from Holland in 1984 and since then Van Diemen Quality Bulbs has continued to expand and are now one of the major producers of not only tulip bulbs, but also dutch iris and liliums. **Peter Lewis** – Birkdale International - "The Production of Citrus species topiaries for Chinese New Year Celebrations"

Peter was a production manager of a large wholesale nursery in Queensland (Birkdale Nursery) for many years before taking on his current role as a horticultural consultant for landscape projects in Shanghai, Macau & Hong Kong for Birkdale International. He is involved in selection of plants for interior & exterior landscape designs, development of landscape maintenance programs and provision of technical analysis & recommendations on horticultural issues in south east Asia.

**Dr Puthiyaparambil Josekutty** - Skybury Coffee Pty Ltd - "Designer plants for the changing environment"



Dr Josekutty (Jose) is a plant biotechnologist with years of experience research and research Global management. warming and climate change are realities and its impact are being felt in the environment all over the world. Unlike animals, plants are

not mobile and have to live in the environment it is born. Natural adaptations do occur in the plant kingdom and the fittest individuals and species survive the adversities caused by the changing environment

**Tony Ferraro** "Observations on using Preforma plugs in commercial plant propagation"

Tony is a well known plant propagator with about 30 years experience in his own nurseries as well as being employed by other businesses throughout that time. He has also taught horticulture at TAFE for around 10 years.

#### Steven Hill - Devonport Transplants

Steve is a 2nd generation propagator and grower of large scale vegetable seedlings and trees. Following a massive downturn in the forestry industry a decade ago, Steve and his staff reinvented their business and moved into micro herb production for supermarket distribution.

**Shane Newitt** – "Giant pumpkin production in Tasmania"

Shane owns a family farm in Sorrell, near Hobart, where his family have been vegetable growers on the rich volcanic soils there for several generations. Shane is currently trying to surpass his Tasmanian record for a giant pumpkin of 422.5 kilograms and will tell us some of his secrets. He was quoted in the Hobart Mercury recently, "It's a science and it's teaching children about farming and looking after the soil."

We will stay over-night at Lufra Hotel at Eaglehawk Neck, www.lufrahotel.com with stunning coastal landscapes outside your door.

**Wednesday 23rd**. It is only a short journey to Port Arthur conservation site *portarthur.org.au/* 

for the morning tour of the 40 ha. Port Arthur Historic Site is a special place for our convict history, and cultural heritage not to mention the scenery. The global significance has been recognised as one of 11 places that make up the UNESCO World Heritage-listed Australian Convict Sites.

The Chang'An Flower Show is a large event occupying over 20,000m2 with indoor and outdoor displays plus large hospitality area. Food, drink and rest is well provided for so all attendees can get maximum enjoyment from their visit. The show has local and foreign exhibitors from various suppliers, wholesalers and retailers providing a single location for gardeners, public and trade.

The main forum of the World Garden Show will be held in the theatre in Zhejiang University of Finance & Economics – Dongfang College. The theme is "Home Gardening and International Trading". Horticultural leaders from around the globe have been invited to discuss the future trends in the industry and how to develop varying gardening brands..

The IPPS forum consists of various professional presentations and workshops looking at many aspects of plant production including; use of perennial plants, plant promotion, breeding, propagation, plant production and health and maintenance of ornamental plants. Wuzhen is a typical Jiangnan water town, which is traditionally known as the "Land of Fish and Rice - Home of the Silk". It is also the permanent home of World Internet Conference - 2014.

Anji county, located in northwest of Zhejiang province, is well known for its bamboo. It started building the Chinese Beautiful Countryside in 2008. In 2010, Anji county became the national standard example of "Chinese Beautiful Countryside". Anji is the also the only winner of the Best Habitat Environment Prize at a country level in China.
